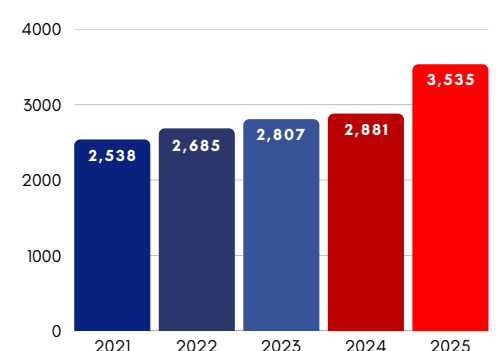

# EAGLE FIRE APPARATUS

## ENGINE



The **Engine** is an apparatus that contains a pump and gallons of water, hose lines, tools, extrication and medical equipment.

## TRUCK



The **Truck** an apparatus that contains a pump and gallons of water, hose lines, tools, extrication, ladders and medical equipment. This truck has a bucket ladder that allows firefighters to operate safely at high angles.

## HEAVY RESCUE



The **Heavy Rescue** specializes in structural collapse, confined space rescue, trench collapse rescue, vehicle extrication and machinery disentanglement, rope rescue and rapid intervention.

## WATER TENDER



The **Water Tender** is an apparatus that specializes in the transport of water from a water source to a fire scene. Water tenders are capable of drafting water from a stream, lake or hydrant. It can carry up to 3000 gallons of water.

## DOZER & TRANSPORT



The **Dozer & Transports** main function is to fight vegetation fires. The Dozer creates lines that are constructed by blading the ground removing flammable plant material down to bare soil.

## BRUSH



The **Brush Truck** is an apparatus that is used in both wildland and suburban settings. It's smaller pick-up body allows the department to carry 500 gallons of water with the maneuverability and accessibility that the larger apparatus can't.



## SWIFTWATER RESCUE BOAT

The **Swiftwater Rescue Boats** is a specialized watercraft designed to navigate fast-flowing rivers and turbulent water environments for the purpose of conducting search and rescue operations.

# LOGISTICS DIVISION

Division Chief of Logistics Sean Marvin is responsible for ensuring that the department has the resources, equipment, and systems necessary to operate effectively. This role focuses on support functions rather than direct firefighting or emergency response. Their duties typically include: Resource Management, Facilities Management, Fleet Management, Technology & Communications, Budget and Procurement, Compliance and Standards, and more.

In essence, the Division of Logistics ensures that the firefighters and the department have everything they need to perform their duties effectively and safely. They play a critical behind-the-scenes role in the success of the fire department.

Congrats to newly appointed Logistics Captain Kory Smith. After serving the district for more than a decade on the line he promotes to Logistics Captain to help manage the division.

# LOGISTICS DIVISION



## Brush Trucks

Worked with SeaWestern Emergency Vehicles to finalize new brush truck specifications and the delivery of 3 new Extreme Type 6 Brush trucks to increase the capability of our wildland fire response.

## New Engine 44

Finalized specifications of a new fire engine that started production in December and will be completed and put in service around April 2026



## New Hose Spec

- Our desired attack hose specification was discontinued by manufacturer
- Worked through a hose evaluation for a new attack fire hose and were able to improve our operational capabilities and with a new hose spec and were able to fund and transition all our fire apparatus to this improved hose spec

## Air Trailer

Worked through vendor selection to design and ordered an "Air Trailer" from Alex Air Apparatus. This will provide the department with mobile supplied air cascade system, a 30KW generator, and will serve as an incident/training support and rehabilitation trailer. Delivery expected summer 2026.



## UTV Trailer

Purchase trailer to transport UTV apparatus to maintenance and off district wildland deployments of Dozer 42

## Academy

Identified needs and purchased all equipment, uniforms and PPE 2025 new hires recruit academy. This included a new look for the recruit uniform.

## Station Improvements

- Station 1 interior and exterior paint project
- Assisted with station 1 remodel project when needed and facilitated new toilets and urinals in all the bathrooms.

## Equipment Upgrades

Upgraded some IT equipment in the administration building and station 1.

## PPE

Purchased replacement turnouts and other PPE to replace aging turnouts nearing end of life.

## Reserve Fleet Upfit

Added equipment inventory to our reserve fleet to decrease downtime in changeover and increase operational capabilities if we need to put an extra engine in service for incidents or special occasions.

## Radios

- Purchased new portable radios to upgrade/refresh existing radios
- Facilitated and coordinated reprogramming of all department radios to meet the new encryption requirements of communications countywide.

## Command Trailer

- Applied for and were rewarded with a grant from the Idaho Office of Emergency Management to update the equipment in our command trailer.
- Facilitated and coordinated purchase and replacement of radio and other technology equipment to meet the modern demand and enhance the command trailers' operational capabilities.

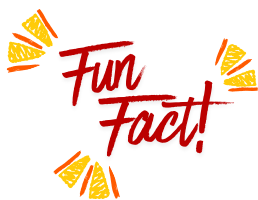

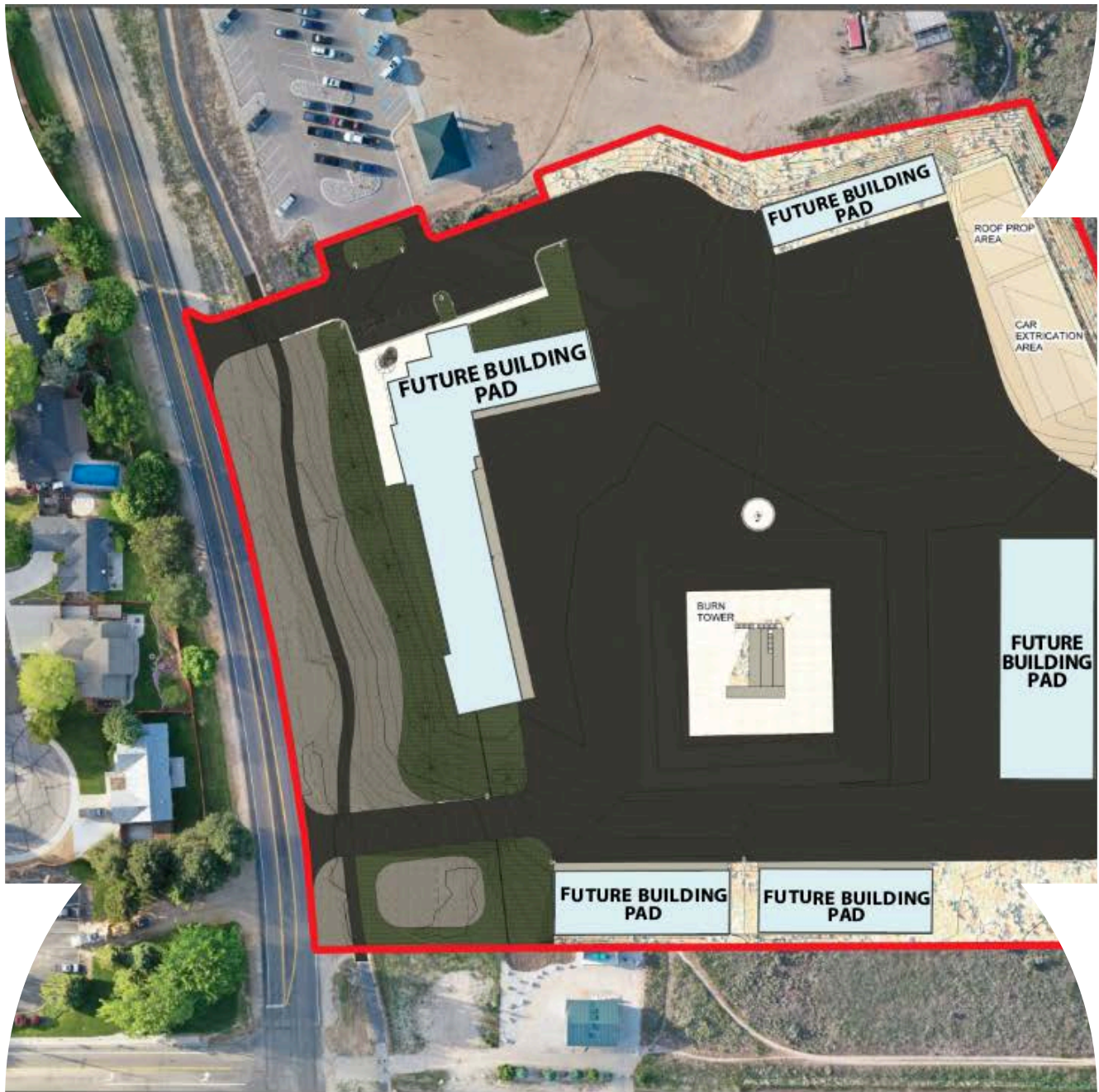


In 2025, the Eagle Fire Department opened the application process for a Recruit Academy scheduled to begin in 2026. The recruitment effort generated significant interest, with 342 applicants competing for seven available positions; an encouraging reflection of the strong reputation of our department and the high level of interest in public service within our community.

## RELOCATION TO BEACON LIGHT

The project we are referring to as the Beacon Light Fire Station Project is a joint venture with the Bureau of Land Management. This project will relocate the Eagle fire station 2 from 3180 E Floating Feather Rd to 12655 N Horseshoe Bend Rd, where we will have a new station and space for a training ground. The project is moving through the design review process, with an expected construction timeline of Spring 2026. The plans for the old fire station are to turn it over to Ada County Paramedics to continue running an advanced life support ambulance out of that location.

This high-ranking role ensures that field operations run smoothly and align with the department's mission. Their responsibilities typically include: Emergency Operations oversight, leadership and supervision, Training & readiness, Operational planning, Resource Allocation, Health & safety among others. In short, the Deputy Chief of Operations is responsible for ensuring the operational side of the fire department functions seamlessly. They ensure readiness, lead incident management, and maintain high performance and safety standards across all emergency response activities.

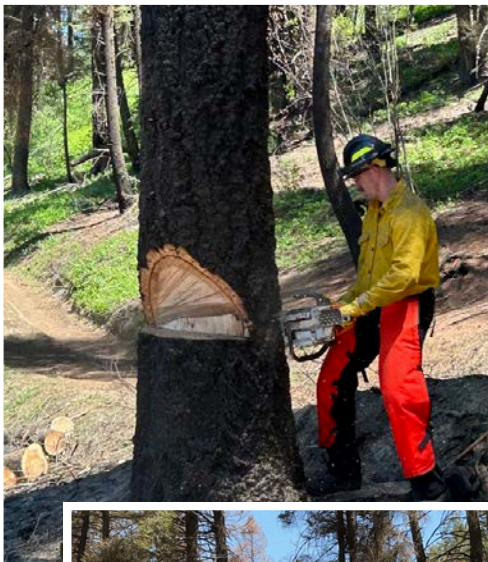
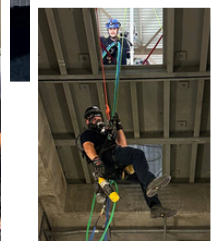
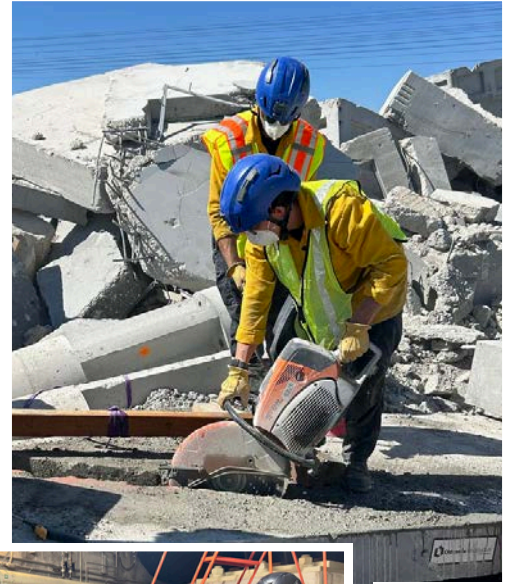
# 2025 NEW RECRUIT ACADEMY

In July, Eagle Fire brought 10 new hires into a 20-week academy, where they gained KSAs (knowledge, skills, and abilities) to the high standards that Eagle Fire expects of its firefighters. Ultimately, nine recruits successfully graduated from the academy and are now serving the Eagle community. If they continue to perform well they should successfully complete their probationary period in July 2026 and be promoted to non-probationary status. It takes a village to grow a firefighter, but three EFD members took on the lion's share of the responsibility. Training Captains Kelly Chadd and Tyler Assmus, and special-duty assignment "Assistant Lead Instructor" Chris Nagle.



# Technical Rescue Team (TRT) TRAINING

2025 was the first formalized efforts to build a Technical Rescue Team in partnership with Boise Fire Department. The TRT is comprised of 4 specialty subjects: Rope, Confined Space, Structural Collapse, and Trench Rescue. A long-term goal of this program is to develop a regional response model comprised of local area department members that are all trained to a standardized curriculum and with standardized equipment. In the short term, EFD now currently has 6 members that have completed all four specialty subject trainings, each training consisting of 5 days of training. These members are, Chad McAfee, Austen Ater, Brian Olson, Brian O'Toole, Brad Devroude, and Mike Gall. EFD has six more members that only have one or two of the remaining specialty courses to complete before they will be fully qualified TRT members. We have a plan to accomplish this goal in 2026.



# Certified Fallers TRAINING

In May, two of our subject matter experts, Tavis Sorensen and Jason Deasy, held a three-day class for wildland fire chainsaws (S-212). This culminated with participants receiving graded qualifications based on their proficiencies at the end of the course. Participant in the course were: Austen Ater, Brian Olsen, Chase Hathhorn, Harrison Moody, Kirk Smith, and Matt Victoriano.

## EDP (ENGINEER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM) COURSES

In April and May, EFD put on two separate Engineer Development Program courses. Each course was 3 weeks long, and participants were moved to a 40-hour work week to complete the program. EFD members participating in this program were able to earn sign offs toward their position task book while gaining valuable information and hands on skills from fire department SMEs (subject matter experts). The members that participated in the program were: Austen Ater, Braxton Bujak, David Butler, Matthew Cota, Jason Deasy, Kirk Smith, Marissa Maddox, Brian O'Toole, and Matt Victoriano. SMEs were: Tony Billingsley, Al Mojica, Tyler Okamura, Josh Bradshaw, Tavis Sorensen, Chris Nagle, Tyler Okamura, Stephen Tyler, and Mike Gall, with Training Captain Kelly Chadd acting as the lead organizer and instructor.

## GIVING BACK TO THE FIRE SERVICE

In partnership with the College of Western Idaho (CWI), brought in two intern firefighters. Sam Neilsen and Josiah Etchechoury successfully completed the internship program and received college credits for their Fire Science degrees.

## THE FIRE MARSHALS

The Eagle Fire Department Code Enforcement Division ensures the safety of the public through enforcement of the adopted fire code. Managed by the Fire Marshal, the duties of the division include: Assisting with inspections of businesses, churches, office buildings, schools and violations and complaints. Reviewing plans for commercial development and residential subdivisions to ensure they comply with applicable codes and regulations. Reviewing plans for fire protection systems, installation and performing acceptance testing of those fire protection systems. Investigating complaints about suspected fire safety hazards. Investigating or assisting the investigation for cause, origin and the circumstances surrounding a fire; and assisting with maintenance of fire safety inspection records.

## PUBLIC EDUCATION



Public education on fire prevention is extremely important here at EFD. Annually our Firefighters visit every daycare and pre-K in the district in addition to the 11 area schools. Crews were able to meet and visit with all kindergarten through 5th graders this year for a total of 3,333 students. Our Firefighters love the opportunity to interact with the kids in addition to delivering a fire safety message.

The Eagle Fire Department meets annually with neighborhood associations affected by the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) zones to educate those communities on valuable insights in planning, preparation, and home protection against wildfires. The Eagle Fire Department also performs individual home WUI assessments on request by homeowners to assist in mitigating defensible space and sharing information about approved fire resistive construction materials.

# COMMUNITY *Outreach* EVENTS



## OPEN HOUSE

In commemoration of Fire Prevention Month, the Eagle Fire Department hosts an annual Open House to engage the community and promote fire safety awareness.

Fire Prevention Month traces its origins back to the devastating fires of October 8, 1871, including the Great Chicago Fire and the lesser-known but far deadlier Peshtigo Fire in Wisconsin. The Peshtigo Fire, which occurred the same day, remains the deadliest wildfire in U.S. history, claiming over 1,200 lives and destroying entire towns. These tragedies underscored the need for better fire safety practices, leading to the establishment of Fire Prevention Week in 1922 by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), which later grew into a month-long observance dedicated to educating the public on fire safety.

Throughout October, we emphasize the importance of fire prevention, including essential safety practices, the role of smoke alarms, and the necessity of having a well-planned home escape route in case of an emergency. Our Open House is a day filled with interactive safety demonstrations, hands-on learning experiences, and fun activities for all ages. Join us as we work together to create a safer community!

# DID *You* KNOW?

A fire station is staffed with a 3- or 4-person crew, each with individual responsibilities within the unit. Our basic unit of response is an engine company which is staffed to be able to respond to a wide range of emergencies including fires, medical emergencies, vehicle accidents and calls for service by the community.

The Eagle Fire Department operates four fire stations that are staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. We have three shifts that each work two consecutive shifts (48 hours) followed by 96 hours off.

The Eagle Fire Protection District, established in 1947, spans 142 square miles. This includes 92 square miles within the City of Eagle, as well as portions of rural Ada, Boise, and Gem counties. Additionally, the District provides fire and rescue services for 50 square miles under contract with North Ada County Fire and Rescue, serving approximately 37,000 residents.

Here at Eagle Fire Department our firefighters undergo extensive and rigorous training to ensure they are well-equipped to handle a diverse range of emergencies, from traumas in the foothills to cardiac arrests and everything in between. It is crucial for us to maintain the highest standards of care, and to achieve this, our team members maintain their Idaho State EMT licenses by obtaining 48 (EMT) or 54 (AEMT) Continuing Education hours every two years. To meet these requirements, we engage in multi-agency trainings with our allied partners and conduct thorough training sessions within our department. This collaborative approach ensures that our team stays updated on the latest advancements and is well-prepared to handle any emergency situation. We take immense pride in providing excellent medical care to the citizens of Eagle. Our goal is to offer timely and effective interventions to help your loved ones during their time of need. Eagle Fire's EMTs are a formidable combination of EMT basics and Advanced EMTs, skilled in a wide array of interventions. These interventions include but are not limited to:

- IV placements
- Advanced airway management
- Intraosseous Infusions
- CPAP administration
- Epinephrine injections for allergic reactions
- Splinting
- Nebulized breathing treatments
- Medication administration, including Narcan
- Assisting in childbirth
